

INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT POLICY

Clean Air Metals Inc. and its wholly owned subsidiary Panoramic PGMs (Canada) Ltd. acknowledge that the Thunder Bay North Critical Minerals Project is on the traditional territories of the Fort William First Nation (FWFN), Red Rock Indian Band (RRIB) and Biinjitiwabik Zaaging Anishinabek (BZA) (the “parties”), as well as the treaty territories of Kiashke Zaaging Anishinaabek and the other Indigenous groups signatory to the Robinson Superior Treaty of 1850. We recognize the contributions of the Métis to the rich history of our region.

The Company appreciates the opportunity to work in these territories and remains committed to the recognition and respect of those who have lived, traveled, and gathered on the lands since time immemorial. Clean Air Metals is committed to stewarding Indigenous heritage and remains committed to building, fostering and encouraging a respectful relationship with First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples based upon principles of mutual trust, respect, reciprocity and collaboration in the spirit of reconciliation. Clean Air Metals recognizes and affirms the existing aboriginal and treaty rights of the aboriginal peoples of Canada, including Indian, Métis and Inuit, as stated in Section 35 of the Constitution Act, 1982. Clean Air Metals also recognizes the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions Call to Action Section 92(3). All staff of Clean Air Metals have taken Indigenous and Métis Awareness Training. **Exploration Agreement**

The parties of FWFN, RRIB and BZA together are the Cooperating Participants in a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) dated January 9, 2021 (press release January 11, 2021) and Exploration Agreement (EA) signed April 13, 2022 (press release April 14, 2022). The EA confirms a framework for a mutually beneficial relationship between the Cooperating Participants regarding the Project. The MOA and new EA establish a foundation for collaborative and respectful communications to facilitate Clean Air Metals' consultation with the Participating First Nations to identify:

- Potential impacts of the Project on the Participating First Nations interests and Rights;
- Design appropriate measures to mitigate and avoid any adverse effects; and
- To adopt an approach which enhances positive impacts and benefits.

Future Negotiation Community Impacts Benefit Agreement

The Cooperating Participants have affirmed their ongoing relationship through the new EA during the exploration phase of the Project effective from May 1, 2020 to present. The Cooperating Participants will work in good faith to negotiate a Long-Term Relationship Agreement (“LTRA”) during the subsequent technical feasibility study phases of the Project.

Robinson Superior Treaty Nations

As communities assert treaty rights to the area that the Thunder Bay North Critical Minerals project is located on, Clean Air Metals will actively engage with those communities to understand their perspectives, their potential impact to established and credible Indigenous rights under section 35 of the constitution and to share project information.

One community that has identified themselves as having rights is Kiashke Zaaging Anishisinaabek (KZA). The company is engaged in active discussions with KZA leadership and is openly sharing information and project plans with them.

Métis Rights Holders

Clean Air Metals is working closely with the Métis Nation of Ontario and the Red Sky Métis Independent Nation to keep them informed of project activities. The company will continue to inform these communities of project plans and activities, as well as provide support for community events. It is the intent of the company that we sign meaningful agreements with each of the Métis communities as the project progresses.
